About the Play

Echoes of Vilna is a Holocaust-era drama inspired by the wartime diary of Yitskhok Rudashevski and other historical accounts from the Vilna Ghetto. Through diary entries, family conversations, and moments of resistance, the play invites us to bear witness to a lost world—and the resilience that outlived it.

Historical Context

- Vilna (Vilnius, Lithuania) was once called "the Jerusalem of the North" for its vibrant Jewish culture. - Between 1941–1943, its Jewish population was decimated through ghettos, deportations, and mass executions at Ponar. - Yitskhok Rudashevski, a 15-year-old diarist, documented life inside the ghetto before his murder in 1943. His writings were discovered post-war and became a rare firsthand account.
